I realized that my opponent had done what I have done in dozens of games - trade off the opponent's three best minor pieces and leave him with his worst one. Now I have dark square weaknesses and am surely fighting for equality. **16.Qc2 Qb4 17.h4**

It shouldn't have taken me 9 minutes to decide on this move. Black has no immediate threats, so I should have either played this right away or found another plan. **17...h5**

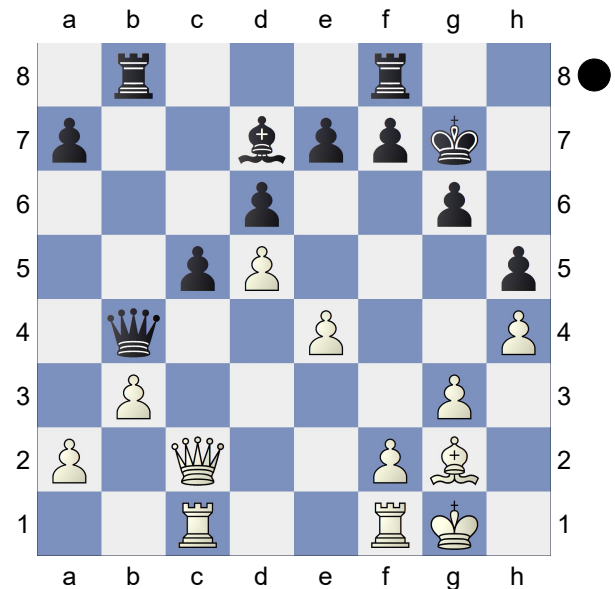

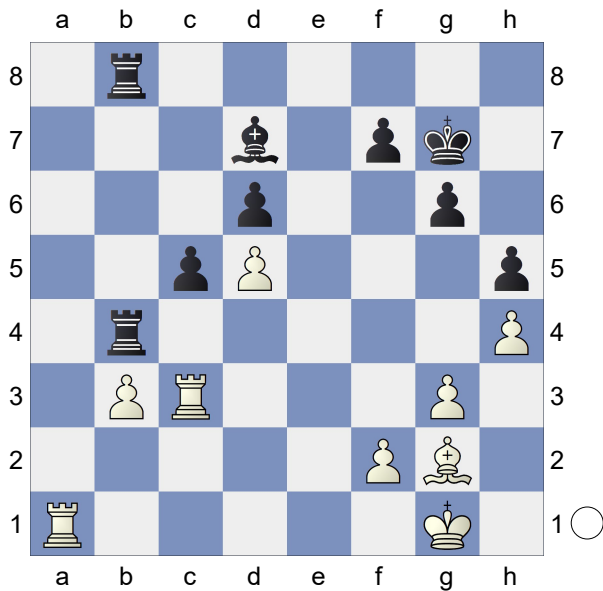

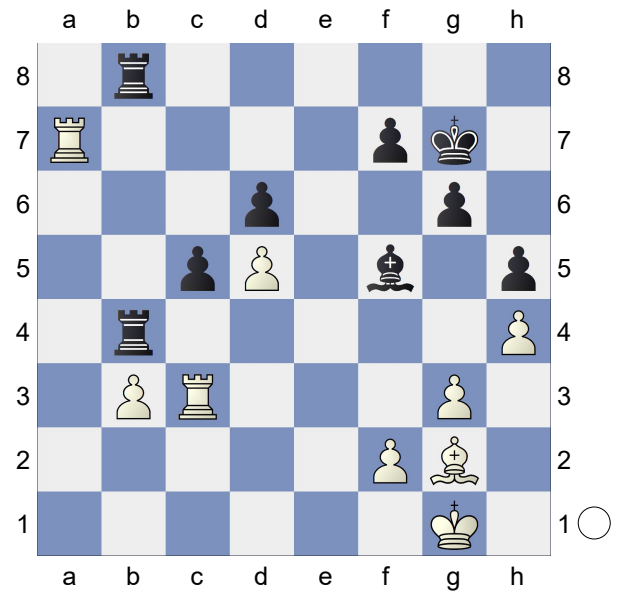

I sometimes think of something that Warren Buffett and his business partner said: if they don't understand something, they won't invest in it, no matter how good it looks. I think I should have just filed this line in the "too difficult" category and played Ra3. In the game, I found that the position ended up having so many variations and subtleties that I used up almost all my time. With a 13-minute time deficit, I needed to be practical and keep the game alive... but it was also psychologically difficult to play a grim move like Ra3 and "just hold on". My opponent took 16 minutes to work out every detail.
