his month, the Library begins subscribing to the *Morningstar Investment* service that provides timely and unbiased investment information and analysis covering thousands of securities.


Complete reports for approximately 2,400 mutual funds, 1,400 stocks, and 400 ETFs are available, with guidance on when to buy, sell or hold particular securities. *Quicktake Reports*, which include portfolio, risk, performance, and management information, covers 13,000 funds and 8,000 stocks. Members will have in-house and remote access to *Morningstar Investment Research Center* through the Institute website. This scope has a wide range of features and components.

For forty years, *The Roy Stories* have been the one continuous unbroken line in the otherwise kaleidoscopic career of one of America's greatest living writers. Spanning time and space—the Southern and Midwestern United States from the 1940s through the 1980s—*The Roy Stories* chronicle the personal history of Gifford from Chicago to Miami in a Hemingway-style Nick Adams story. Emotional, exploratory, and brimming with photographic realism, these stories defy the parameters of memoir or autobiography.

Poet, novelist and master of the short story, Barry Gifford, is best known for Wild at Heart, Sailor & Lula: The Complete Novels, Sad Stories of the Death of Kings, Memories from a Sinking Ship: A Novel and Landscape with Traveler. He has published over forty works of fiction, nonfiction, and poetry, which have been translated into twenty-eight languages.



Morningstar Investment Research Center Databases

Morningstar is the premier source of unbiased information for thousands of mutual funds, and a respected source of information on stocks. This new Library subscription, a companion database to two very popular newsletters, the Morningstar *DividendInvestor* and the Morningstar *FundInvestor*, provides complete reports for some 2,400 funds and 1,400 stocks.

Learn the three different ways of utilizing Morningstar Investment Research Center: how to search for mutual fund or stock reports by name or ticker symbol; how to generate a list of investments that meet particular criteria using the Screeners feature; and, how to analyze your securities portfolio, look for strengths and weaknesses, and risk factors. Class attendees will also be shown how Morningstar reports may be printed or downloaded. **Members Only. Registration Required.**

Search the *Morningstar Investment Research Center* for specific mutual funds or stocks by name or ticker symbol to retrieve analyst research and reports, a current price quote, chart, analysis, financial statements and key ratios, valuation, a Morningstar Rating when available, information on shareholders and insider trading, as well as SEC filings. The "Stock or Funds Favorites" component provides lists of Morningstar's top selections, securities with a 5-star Morningstar rating.

The "Screeners" feature covering stocks, mutual funds, or ETFs is an easy and efficient way to sort through thousands of securities to generate short lists of possible investments that meet particular criteria, such as large-cap growth funds with a star rating of 4 or better. Several hundred data points can be selected as screening criteria.

The "Portfolio" component of this service provides access to a suite of planning tools and calculators that help determine what your asset mix should be and help to design an investment portfolio. The "Portfolio X-Ray" feature outlines the strengths and weaknesses in a portfolio of stocks and mutual funds, and indicates potential risk factors and degree of portfolio diversification.

The "Newsletter Module" is a resourceful component of the Morningstar service, with access to popular investment letters such as *DividendInvestor* and *FundInvestor*. Many members will already be familiar with these publications to which the Library currently subscribes in print format. Members now have access to two additional publications, namely *Morningstar StockInvestor* and *ETFInvestor*. Current and archived monthly issues of all four publications in PDF format will be accessible.

The Library currently subscribes to ValueLine Resource Center and Standard & Poor's NetAdvantage. The addition of Morningstar Investment Research Center to this group creates a well-rounded trio of web-based investment services covering an impressive number of securities.

The Inheritor's Powder: a tale of arsenic murder and new forensic science by Sandra Hempel

've been burning to read this book since I first learned about James Marsh, a chemist employed by the Royal Arsenal in Woolwich (outside of London), and his discovery of a test for arsenic. Marsh was an associate of my subject's father and I was hoping the book would give me few leads as to the scientific environment and people at the Royal Arsenal. Unfortunately it didn't, but despite that *The Inheritor's Powder* is a fascinating read!

The book traces the court case of John Bodle – the grandson of wealthy farmer George Bodle who suddenly fell desperately ill on the morning of November 2, 1833. Three days later he died in agony – presumably from arsenic. The resulting investigation riveted the nation and attracted world-wide notoriety for the characters involved.

Arsenic was used in practically everything in the 19th century – in wallpaper, clothing dyes, hat ornaments, candles, candy and even beer and wine as well as rat poison. Accidental and of course, purposeful arsenic poisonings were routine but difficult for authorities to prove. It wasn't until James Marsh discovered a method for testing that provided a visual proof (versus an iffy "garlic smell") that prosecution of arsenic crimes could proceed with any certainty.

The Inheritor's Powder is a gripping read, particularly if you enjoy forensic science and historical whodunits.

Writers as diverse as Joan Didion, George Orwell, and David Foster Wallace have excelled at the form, proving its elasticity and variety. Essays—from the French verb essayer, "to try"—involve thinking on the page, exploring assumptions and observations as well as describing the world around us, from the death of a moth (Virginia Woolf) to a meditation on hating (William Hazlitt).
