


## An Evening with Prix Goncourt Winner Eric Vuillard

On November 8 we welcomed author and filmmaker Eric Vuillard to discuss his acclaimed book, *The Order of the Day,* winner of the Prix Goncourt, the highest literary award in France. It was an honor to present this eloquent author in collaboration with the French Embassy & Consulate and Alliance Francaise. Vuillard was in conversation with San Francisco mystery writer Cara Black and interpreter Christiane Abel.

The evening proved to be stimulating, provocative, and topical all at the same time. Looking back at history's most devastating moments, this book reveals the machinations of Germany's Nazi regime and the 1938 annexation of Austria - known as the Anschluss - and its players and betrayers. Eric discussed the many ways literature portrays history from Balzac to Cooper, but does not consider his work historical fiction. Although his writing has a poetic and cinematic style, the book is based on facts and interviews, exposing what actually happened without reinvention.

## MI Chess Director John Donaldson Retires

International Master John Donaldson, the longest-serving chess director in the history of the Mechanics' Institute, has stepped down after 20 years of service. John considered it a good time to retire when he recently joined Barry Bonds in the 500/500 club (500 games rated over 2500 USCF and 500 USCF rated tournaments directed). He looks forward to playing more and continuing his other chess-related activities.

Over the past 35 years, Donaldson has been a chess professional working as a writer, journalist, player, coach, and historian of the game. He has served as the U.S. team captain 21 times, including 13 of the biennial Chess Olympiads. Highlights include first-place finishes in the 1993 World Team Championship and the 2016 Chess Olympiad.




