No Human is Illegal

An Attorney on the Frontlines of the Immigration War

Author J.J. Mulligan Sepulveda visited us in January for a lively conversation with Attorney Holly Cooper

In an event cosponsored by California Historical Society and Refugee Transitions, J.J. Mulligan Sepulveda, author of *No Human is Illegal*, and attorney Holly Cooper, Co-Director of UC Davis's Immigration Law Clinic (ILC) offered riveting stories about their civil rights work aiding and supporting immigrants and refugees in California. Lawyers and the students in the ILC program work directly with undocumented immigrants in the Davis area and respond to the call for legal assistance at airports, borders, and clinics across the country.

Sepulveda and Cooper told the stories of those seeking refuge in our country for political or economic reasons to shed light on human rights violations at the border – including the perpetration of family separations, incarceration, and detainments – speaking on behalf of those fleeing untenable situations, and underscoring how they are so often used as tactical pawns

in a political game. The presenters discussed the imperative to put a human face on immigration, rather than relying on law enforcement as the primary approach to the immigration reforms necessary to support undocumented immigrants and the young generation of Dreamers living and working in the United States.

These immigrants' stories bring to mind the words of Emma Lazarus inscribed on the "Mother of Exiles" – the Statue of Liberty that once welcomed strangers to Ellis Island. "From her beacon-hand glows world-wide welcome..." Lazarus's Liberty declares, "Keep your storied pomp," to those nations who exhibit more regard for their history, than compassion for the "tempest-tost." This discussion reminded those in attendance to extend that world-wide welcome to a new group of immigrants whose myriad contributions will make America great, just as immigrants have been doing for nearly 300 years.



Treasure Island, constructed from Bay mud in 1936-37, hosted the last of San Francisco's three World's Fairs. It was also the last in a series of American expositions promising exciting modern design, jaw-dropping technology, and the romance of progress as an escape from the Depression. With its exotic architecture, brilliant lighting and color, and spectacular landscaping, the Golden Gate International Exposition was a "Pageant of the Pacific," with art and programming envisioning peace and unity across the Pacific region. Within days after the lights went out for the last time, the Navy moved onto the island, and the dream of "Pacific Unity" was shattered by the beginning of the Pacific War in 1941.

2019 is the 80th anniversary of the Golden Gate International Exposition. Sounds like a reason to have a party! The Mechanics' Institute, in conjunction with the Treasure Island Museum, will be hosting a full day of festivities on April 4, including an afternoon of lectures that explain, honor, and celebrate the Exposition; and a snazzy evening cocktail party. There you will enjoy a keynote address by acclaimed Treasure Island and Mechanics' Institute scholar Richard Reinhardt, music of the times by Lovin' Harmony Trio, and appetizers, wine, and craft liquor tastings. New Events, New Formats, Expansion of Programs

The Mechanics' Institute Chess Club will be offering a wide range of diverse tournament offerings over the next year that will satisfy the tastes of all types of players. On Monday nights beginning March 18, we will be offering our Monday Night Rapids, which will be a 4 round FIDE and USCF rated tournament with time controls of G/15+2. This will give players the opportunity to compete under faster time controls at an exciting pace that can be fit into one evening.

Our historic Tuesday Night Marathon (TNM) will have a new format for the Spring TNM, beginning March 19. It will be a 3 section tournament, each with its own prizes. We will have a 2000+, 1600-1999, and under 1600 sections. Play up option is available for players if they are within 200 rating points of the section. This will generate action and intrigue in the event and create competitive sections and games each and every week.

We will be hosting two State Championship events this year, with the 2019 CalChess Senior State Championship May 17-19, and the 2019 CalChess Rapid Championship October 26-27.

Also, we have modified some of our monthly weekend events to incorporate longer time controls such as G/90+30 and we will begin offering a monthly scholastic tournament at West Portal Elementary beginning April 15.
